





We give thanks to you, O God, for the goodness and love which you have made known to us in creation; in the calling of Israel to be your people; in your Word spoken through the prophets; and above all in the Word made flesh, Jesus, your Son. For in these last days you sent him to be incarnate from the Virgin Mary, to be the Savior and Redeemer of the world. In him, you have delivered us from evil, and made us worthy to stand before you. 





SAINT AUGUSTINE'S CORNER:

Gargoyles and Chimeras - music ecovative of the e'en of All Hallows!

Leon Boellmann lived an all-too-short life, coming one generation following our other featured composer, French Romantic Era giant, Cesar Franck. Born the son of a chemist, Boellmann was a native of Alsace, in the last half to the 19th century. Like Franck, Boellmann was a child prodigy, earning the attention of the elite in PAris, and eventually studying at the Paris Conservatoire. There, he learned organ, piano, and counterpoint with Eugene Gigout and Cesar Franck. Following a tenure as the Organiste du Choeur (choir accompanist) at the church of St. Vincent De Paul in PAris, he ascended the role of "Titulaire Organist" (equivalent to music director in our language). In the French cathedral school, there were typically two organs in the space - a choir rogan, in the chancel, and the grand organ in the rear of the nave. The choir organists' position entailed overseeing the painstaking job of doubling the choir on the smaller organ in the front. The titulaire organist improvised the service music and accompanied congregational song from the rear organ, which was typically much larger.

Boellmann composed very little for organ and choir, since he only lived to be 53 years old, suffering a vastly premature death from tuberculosis. Tragically, he left a wife and young daughter and two sons. NEvertheless, his short life left a legacy in the national school of organ and improvisation. His 'Suite Gothique" evokes the imagery of a gothic cathedral, with its dark form, high ceilings, vaulted archway, and images of saints, and gargoyles. The piece was composed in 1895, two short years before Boellmann's death. In the Introduction, we hear a grand choral theme, in the dramatic key of c-minor. Following this, the movement concludes with a fast minuet in the parallel major, forming the genus of a grand dance. The Priere a Notre Dame (Prayer to the Blessed Mother) is a beautiful song without words, featuring the lovely harmonic flute, accompanied gently by strings.

Continuing our Franck programming from last week (we heard his Cantabile, from his three pieces for organ), today we hear the immortal solo "Panis Angelicus" This eucharistic hymn is taken from the propers of the feast of Corpus Christi, which commemorates the veneration of the body and blood of Our Lord. The text was composed by St. Thomas Aquinas specifically for this feast. Franck's treatment of the text is lovely, intertwining, in canon, a beautiful melody between instrument and solo voice (sometimes this piece is also performed chorally with soloist). The music evokes comfort and assurance. And finally, we hear the inimitable anthem by Thomas Tallis, English Reformation composer, 'If ye love me." We recorded this piece during an outdoor choir recording at Princeton University in August.

UPDATED ALL SAINTS' REOPENING PLAN:

Dear All Saints Parish family and friends,

I write with an update for our phased reopening plans. Here are primary decisions; context follows.

First, beginning October 19th week, we brought two more of our primary tenants back into the building on a very limited capacity.

The numbers of those attending are minimal; safety practices are rigorous, and in keeping with the Diocese of New Jersey regulations for outside groups and tenants, along with the Governor's mandates. Health Screens, Distancing, Mask Wearing, Disinfecting, and other safety requirements are strictly enforced by signed, written agreements from the leadership of each group.

The Princeton Learning Cooperative or (PLC), is using the Undercroft area as in past practice from Monday through Friday. The Winner's Circle, our AA Group has a very limited number of persons meeting in our Sanctuary daily; with use of our Parish South Reception Room on weekends (Saturday/Sunday) at times.

The Princeton Learning Cooperative will be on the same phased reopening as the Princeton Public School System, with middle and senior high students also began in-person learning on October 19th week. The Princeton Family Community Learning Center (PFCLC) has been open since late April, primarily serving the children of essential employees—again—with a very limited capacity.

Our two schools, on limited capacity in our building, serve a lower risk population; we will be continuing to monitor safety practices. Our AA Group might be considered an essential health service. It is for reasons of essential health, education, and day-care that we welcome these tenants—even with very limited capacity for numbers—into our building at all.

Second, with the support of our Wardens, Reopening Committee and Vestry, I have made the decision that we will continue to worship online on Sunday mornings, and with outdoor mid-week Evening Prayer services for the foreseeable future. At this time, we will designate no prospective date for inbuilding worship on Sunday mornings, or otherwise. This also includes sacramental events like Weddings and Funerals.

We will have to take our plans, in the 12 Step mantra, "one day at a time." Health care officials warn that in-building activities--for any length of time—are very risky actions possible during this stage of the epidemic. Our All Saints Church population, as the population of most Episcopal Churches and mainline Christianity, serves a more high- risk population of a senior age demographic. With great sadness, evidence suggests that COVID cases are increasing throughout our nation; this is now, ever more sadly, the case in New Jersey; hospitalizations are increasing in our nation and state.

We continue to lose more than 1,000 per day throughout the nation; in no way is this epidemic of COVID remotely contained in our nation; now, perhaps even our state. We may even be experiencing a "second wave" of this COVID epidemic in our nation—and state—as more and more persons resume in-building activities—and become lax with safety practices. Because we have been committed to the Gospel imperative of Neighbor-Love; and the Promise of our Baptismal Covenant to respect the dignity of every human being, **our All Saints Church practices have resulted in no COVID exposure, and no COVID illness.** This may be the most important and critical Christian fidelity during these past few months of this Epidemic of life-threatening illness! I want this fidelity to continue.

Our Sunday morning events of worship and formation--and our mid-week outdoor evening prayer services--are attracting significant participation; we are *together as a parish family* on Sunday mornings through our Zoom online platform. In my judgement, in-person worship on Sunday mornings, with very strict safety protocols, no congregational singing, limited access to Holy Communion (offered only in one kind—bread), distancing, diocesan probation of shared fellowship time and meals—is simply not worth the risk—and is far less effective than our being together online. We will continue to live-stream our lovely music with a talented organist, music director, and choral staff; and we will be together in Christian community.

Let us—as we have throughout these past few months—live in Christ's compassion and mercy; let us always seek understanding, patience and sensitivity to one another; let us rejoice that the Christ is present powerfully in Christian community within our online meetings as in our building; let us remember that Christ's altar is not only in a building, but in the world; let us be mindful that the Holy Spirit, above all, resides in a community of love.

Elly and I send our deepest prayers.

As always, I share our continuing foundational prayer, A Prayer Attributed to St. Francis:

Lord, make us instruments of your peace. Where there is hatred, let us sow love; where there is injury, pardon; where there is discord, union; where there is doubt, faith; where

there is despair, hope; where there is darkness, light; where there is sadness, joy. Grant that we may not so much seek to be consoled as to console; to be understood as to understand; to be loved as to love. For it is in giving that we receive; it is in pardoning that we are pardoned; and it is in dying that we are born to eternal life. *Amen*.

PLEASE WELCOME OUR NEW PRINCETON THEOLOGICAL SEMINARIAN INTERN: We welcome this Sunday, Elliot Vanhoy, as our Princeton Seminary Intern for the 2020--2021 Academic Year. Although Princeton Seminary is offering only remote/Online Learning this semester, Elliot is one of a community of students who have decided to return to campus for the academic year. ARM IN ARM URGENT CALL FOR VOLUNTEERS: Dear All Saints' Parish Family,

In the 25th chapter of Matthew's gospel, Jesus commands us to feed the hungry; as we do for the least among us, we have done for him. All Saints' Church is a partner of Arm in Arm, a ministry in Trenton that, among other services, operates a food pantry.

The need for food assistance is especially acute in 2020, as the economic depression resulting from the COVID-19 pandemic has forced many low-wage workers out of their jobs. Arm in Arm feeds around 70 families every day, with food packages meant to last a few weeks.

You may recall that All Saints recently made a cash gift in support of the Arm in Arm food pantry. Now, the pantry is in need of volunteers. If there are not more people coming to help out, they may have to curtail services on certain days.

A shift at Arm in Arm entails a 1.5-2 hour commitment. Activities may include: packing bags with groceries, restocking the shelves, or helping to hand out bags to families who visit the pantry. You will be on your feet most of the time.

It's a great way to get out of the house, meet new people, and serve your neighbors and through them our Lord. (And, as a little treat, I like to stop at the Polish bakery on the way home and grab some pastries!)
