

Advent Candle Devotion


The Leader says: Why are we lighting a candle?



Litany for Advent Week One: Hope

We enter into this first Sunday of the Advent season, turning our attention to You, God. We acknowledge the darkness that is within us, and that permeates the world.

Father, forgive us.

We acknowledge the suffering, tragedy, and pain by which humanity is afflicted, which seems at times to overwhelm us.

Draw near to us, Oh God.

We consider the mystery of your ways, that you might choose to send our Savior as an innocent baby and not as a warrior or a king; as one who humbly accepted suffering and humiliation and called it glory.

Our hope is in Jesus Christ, the Messiah.

We choose in this moment to focus our attention on HOPE; the hope of Jesus Christ and all his coming represents for suffering people, the hope for restoration of all that is broken in the world, the hope of new life and resurrection.

Hope is the light we wish to see by.

Grant, Oh God, that when he comes, Christ may find us waiting in expectation, our souls quieted, our hearts soft and open.

We wait in hope for the Lord.

In Christ all things are made new, and we look forward to the day our hope is fulfilled, each heart reconciled, the work of Christ completed in all the earth.

Our hope is in Jesus Christ, the Messiah. Amen

Silence is kept, during which the People may add their own petitions, silently or aloud. The Celebrant concludes

O Lord our God, accept the fervent prayers of your people; in the multitude of your mercies, look with compassion upon us and all who turn to you for help; for you are gracious, O lover of souls, and to you we give glory, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, now and forever. *Amen.*

The Confession of Sin and Absolution

The Celebrant or Deacon says

Let us humbly confess our sins unto Almighty God.

The congregation may either kneel or remain standing. A brief period of silence is kept, after which the Ministers and People say in unison:

Almighty and most merciful Father,

we have erred and strayed from thy ways like lost sheep, we have followed too much the devices and desires of our own hearts, we have offended against thy holy laws, we have left undone those things which we ought to have done, and we have done those things which we ought not to have done.

But thou, O Lord, have mercy upon us,

spare thou those who confess their faults, restore thou those who are penitent, according to thy promises declared unto mankind in Christ Jesus our Lord; and grant, O most merciful Father, for his sake,

that we may hereafter live a godly, righteous, and sober life, to the glory of thy holy Name. Amen.

The Bishop when present, or the Priest, stands and says

Almighty God have mercy on you, forgive you all your sins through our Lord Jesus Christ, strengthen you in all goodness, and by the power of the Holy Spirit keep you in eternal life. *Amen.*



He stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world.

On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me." After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me." Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith:

People: Christ has died.

Christ is risen.

Christ will come again.

The Celebrant continues

We celebrate the memorial of our redemption, O Father, in this sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving. Recalling his death, resurrection, and ascension, we offer you these gifts. Sanctify them by your Holy Spirit to be for your people the Body and Blood of your Son, the holy food and drink of new and unending life in him. Sanctify us also that we may faithfully receive this holy Sacrament, and serve you in unity, constancy, and peace; and at the last day bring us with all your saints into the joy of your eternal kingdom.

All this we ask through your Son Jesus Christ. By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever. **AMEN.**

SAINT AUGUSTINE'S CORNER: Today we welcome a new year! A new liturgical year, that is. We celebrate the liturgical season of Advent, which is a time of waiting and reflection, of anticipation, and of hope. For this reason, we turn from the green liturgical color of Ordinary Time (or the 'regular' season following Pentecost, to a dark blue or purple to honor a more penitential time. In the Western Church, the season of Advent draws its roots from Tours, France, around the 5th Century A.D., and is derived from the Latin word 'Adventus' or, 'to wait.' Indeed, we wait for the coming of the savior, and at All Saints', we commemorate this by implementing Rite 1, or a more traditional liturgical form, our hymns and service music are more introspective in nature, psalmody is to plainsong, and the ritual is more solemn. Our mass parts will be taken from the congregational mass "Missa Maria Magdalena" by Canadian composer Healey Willan. This all reflects the tone we are setting for the month of Advent.

When Charles Jennens collaborated with composer George Frederick Handel, they conceived of an idea of a libretto, set to music, to entertain and educate the masses on the life of Jesus, in their oratorio 'Messiah." Published in 1741, the play was composed for King George II, as Handel was his master of music in the Chapel Royal. The work as a whole is among the most popular in classical canon. Although most iterations are performed at Christmastime, and in Advent, the piece was actually first performed and intended for Holy Week. Today, we hear the first recitative and air from the first part, the immortal 'Comfort Ye', and 'Every Valley.' These movements open the piece, and set a peaceful and hopeful tone in the prophecy of Our Lord. The pieces are sung by tenor soloist.

The setting of "Nun Komm der Heiden Heiland" (Savior of the Nations, Come), is traditionally used on the first Sunday of Advent. The text is by Martin Luther, and it is a paraphrase of the Latin plainsong 'Veni Redemptor Gentium.' As a congregation, we will sing this hymn for the sequence hymn. During communion, we will hear a reflective and personal aria from Bach's choral cantata based on the tune 'Nun Komm.' This aria, set for high mezzo soprano, is a reflection on a soul knocking on the door to the Kingdom of God, and asking kindly to be let in -- and asking Jesus into her heart. It is lovely and intimate. And for the postlude, we hear the ornamented chorale prelude by Bach "Nun Komm der Heiden Heiland" or "Savior of the Nations, Come." The music is meditative (for a traditional postlude), and the gentle tune is 'dressed up' in a solo registration, accompanied by a flowing accompaniment. And today's choral anthem will be a setting of a spiritual setting by contemporary composer Andre Thomas, and his setting "Keep Your Lamps." As with most spiritual repertoire, the meaning of the piece is double, representing the eschatological text to 'keep our lamps burning' to meet the savior; indeed, the second meaning is representational of the Underground Railroad, and the African Americans who were waiting their freedom journey as 'the time is drawing nigh.'

Many of you read **Forward Day by Day**; our parish online Advent calendar would be a kind of *Forward Day by Day* for All Saints Church for the Season of Advent, written by All Saints parishioners, clergy, staff and friends. If you'd like to participate, please contribute one Advent reflection answering the question: "What does Christmas mean to me this year?" This should be no more than a few sentences, but may also be a poem, a devotion, a reflection by an author you love, a scripture that means a much to you, a piece of visual art, or anything you would like to share. Please feel free to keep it simple. We want your heart and participation—not perfection. Once finished, please e-mail our Parish Administrator, Sarah Nickelson (parishadmin@allsaint.org) with your contribution.

Each day during Advent, you will receive an Advent Devotion shared by members of our All Saints' Parish family. Each devotion will also include a link to a piece of music illuminating Advent and Christmas themes.

Please continue to send your contributions to Sarah.

How is this an *Advent* reflection? Because Advent is a time of patient waiting and expectation for the birth of the Messiah anew in Bethlehem. Our Advent waiting can also be a time of reflection and anticipation of the great feast of the Incarnation. Thank you! We would value your participation!

UPDATED ALL SAINTS' REOPENING PLAN:

Dear All Saints Parish family and friends,

I write with an update for our phased reopening plans. Here are primary decisions; context follows.

First, beginning October 19th week, we brought two more of our primary tenants back into the building on a very limited capacity.

The numbers of those attending are minimal; safety practices are rigorous, and in keeping with the Diocese of New Jersey regulations for outside groups and tenants, along with the Governor's mandates. Health Screens, Distancing, Mask Wearing, Disinfecting, and other safety requirements are strictly enforced by signed, written agreements from the leadership of each group.

The Princeton Learning Cooperative or (PLC), is using the Undercroft area as in past practice from Monday through Friday. The Winner's Circle, our AA Group has a very limited number of persons meeting in our Sanctuary daily; with use of our Parish South Reception Room on weekends (Saturday/Sunday) at times.

The Princeton Learning Cooperative will be on the same phased reopening as the Princeton Public School System, with middle and senior high students also began in-person learning on October 19th week. The Princeton Family Community Learning Center (PFCLC) has been open since late April, primarily serving the children of essential employees—again—with a very limited capacity.

Our two schools, on limited capacity in our building, serve a lower risk population; we will be continuing to monitor safety practices. Our AA Group might be considered an essential health service. It is for reasons of essential health, education, and day-care that we welcome these tenants—even with very limited capacity for numbers—into our building at all.

Second, with the support of our Wardens, Reopening Committee and Vestry, I have made the decision that we will continue to worship online on Sunday mornings, and with outdoor mid-week Evening Prayer services for the foreseeable future. At this time, we will designate no prospective date for inbuilding worship on Sunday mornings, or otherwise. This also includes sacramental events like Weddings and Funerals.

We will have to take our plans, in the 12 Step mantra, "one day at a time." Health care officials warn that in-building activities--for any length of time—are very risky actions possible during this stage of the epidemic. Our All Saints Church population, as the population of most Episcopal Churches and mainline Christianity, serves a more high- risk population of a senior age demographic. With great sadness, evidence suggests that COVID cases are increasing throughout our nation; this is now, ever more sadly, the case in New Jersey; hospitalizations are increasing in our nation and state.

We continue to lose more than 1,000 per day throughout the nation; in no way is this epidemic of COVID remotely contained in our nation; now, perhaps even our state. We may even be experiencing a "second wave" of this COVID epidemic in our nation—and state—as more and more persons resume in-building activities—and become lax with safety practices. Because we have been committed to the Gospel imperative of Neighbor-Love; and the Promise of our Baptismal Covenant to respect the dignity of every human being, **our All Saints Church practices have resulted in no COVID exposure, and no COVID illness.** This may be the most important and critical Christian fidelity during these past few months of this Epidemic of life-threatening illness! I want this fidelity to continue.

Our Sunday morning events of worship and formation--and our mid-week outdoor evening prayer services--are attracting significant participation; we are *together as a parish family* on Sunday mornings through our Zoom online platform. In my judgement, in-person worship on Sunday mornings, with very

strict safety protocols, no congregational singing, limited access to Holy Communion (offered only in one kind—bread), distancing, diocesan probation of shared fellowship time and meals—is simply not worth the risk—and is far less effective than our being together online. We will continue to live-stream our lovely music with a talented organist, music director, and choral staff; and we will be together in Christian community.

Let us—as we have throughout these past few months—live in Christ's compassion and mercy; let us always seek understanding, patience and sensitivity to one another; let us rejoice that the Christ is present powerfully in Christian community within our online meetings as in our building; let us remember that Christ's altar is not only in a building, but in the world; let us be mindful that the Holy Spirit, above all, resides in a community of love.

Elly and I send our deepest prayers.

As always, I share our continuing foundational prayer, A Prayer Attributed to St. Francis:

Lord, make us instruments of your peace. Where there is hatred, let us sow love; where there is injury, pardon; where there is discord, union; where there is doubt, faith; where there is despair, hope; where there is darkness, light; where there is sadness, joy. Grant that we may not so much seek to be consoled as to console; to be understood as to understand; to be loved as to love. For it is in giving that we receive; it is in pardoning that we are pardoned; and it is in dying that we are born to eternal life. *Amen*.
