





### The First Lesson Acts 10:34-43

Peter began to speak to Cornelius and the other Gentiles: "I truly understand that God shows no partiality, but in every nation anyone who fears him and does what is right is acceptable to him. You know the message he sent to the people of Israel, preaching peace by Jesus Christ--he is Lord of all. That message spread throughout Judea, beginning in Galilee after the baptism that John announced: how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and with power; how he went about doing good and healing all who were oppressed by the devil, for God was with him. We are witnesses to all that he did both in Judea and in Jerusalem. They put him to death by hanging him on a tree; but God raised him on the third day and allowed him to appear, not to all the people but to us who were chosen by God as witnesses, and who ate and drank with him after he rose from the dead. He commanded us to preach to the people and to testify that he is the one ordained by God as judge of the living and the dead. All the prophets testify about him that everyone who believes in him receives forgiveness of sins through his name."

### The Second Lesson

#### 1 Corinthians 15:1-11

I would remind you, brothers and sisters, of the good news that I proclaimed to you, which you in turn received, in which also you stand, through which also you are being saved, if you hold firmly to the message that I proclaimed to you--unless you have come to believe in vain.

For I handed on to you as of first importance what I in turn had received: that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the scriptures, and that he was buried, and that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the scriptures, and that he appeared to Cephas, then to the twelve. Then he appeared to more than five hundred brothers and sisters at one time, most of whom are still alive, though some have died. Then he appeared to James, then to all the apostles. Last of all, as to one untimely born, he appeared also to me. For I am the least of the apostles, unfit to be called an apostle, because I persecuted the church of God. But by the grace of God I am what I am, and his grace toward me has not been in vain. On the contrary, I worked harder than any of them--though it was not I, but the grace of God that is with me. Whether then it was I or they, so we proclaim and so you have come to believe.

# The Gospel Mark 16:1-8

When the sabbath was over, Mary Magdalene, and Mary the mother of James, and Salome bought spices, so that they might go and anoint Jesus. And very early on the first day of the week, when the sun had risen, they went to the tomb. They had been saying to one another, "Who will roll away the stone for us from the entrance to the tomb?" When they looked up, they saw that the stone, which was very large, had already been rolled back. As they entered the tomb, they saw a young man, dressed in a white robe, sitting on the right side; and they were alarmed. But he said to them, "Do not be alarmed; you are looking for Jesus of Nazareth, who was crucified. He has been raised; he is not here. Look, there is the place they laid him. But go, tell his disciples and Peter that he is going ahead of you to Galilee; there you will see him, just as he told you." So they went out and fled from the tomb, for terror and amazement had seized them; and they said nothing to anyone, for they were afraid.



#### By your will they were created and have their being.





**PASTORAL LETTER AND MOST UP-TO-DATE REOPENING PLAN:** Following a recent Vestry meeting, I wanted to write with an update on Christian life and future reopening plans for All Saints Parish. We are approaching one year of life together at All Saints Church during the COVID-19 Pandemic. We have been together in Christian community with online life, including online Sunday worship, since the week of March 9<sup>th</sup>, 2020, beginning with Sunday, March 15, 2020.

We have been very blessed and fortunate with talented resources in our parish family, including especially our Tech-Master and Communications staff member, Tommy O'Malia. Thanks to Tommy, we have been able to live-stream our music, utilizing our gifted director of Music, Kevin O'Malia, and our talented Choral Staff. Our devoted Senior Warden, Charles Colagiuri, has provided invaluable input for training and resources for accessing our Zoom platform, which has been the gathering method for our parish life.

We recently concluded lovely services for Ash Wednesday and the First Sunday of Lent. We now have four mid-week small group opportunities for bible study and reflection. We offer two group opportunities for Christian formation each Sunday, with our Adult Forum and Virtual Coffee Hour/Film Discussion. We have ministries for service delivery and telephone/support contact. We recently concluded an amazing Stewardship Campaign with increased giving and new pledges to fund our mission and ministry priorities for 2021. Pastor Maddy is beginning an online Confirmation class this March and regularly communicates with the children and youth of All Saints Church through a weekly gathering and packets of resources for Christian formation.

Our parish is strong, thriving, and above all, our ministry practices have resulted in no cases, exposure or serious illness or death. I have been thrilled by so many of our parish family, particularly our seniors, "stretching" to use computers, phones, TV/YouTube, and technology of all sorts to access our gatherings, groups, and especially our Sunday services.

In keeping with the recommendation of the Diocese of NJ Reopening Committee and our Bishop, and due to still high levels of community spread of COVID, continuing high case numbers, and continuing high levels of hospitalization and illness in New Jersey, we are keeping most our life together at All Saints Church online for the immediate future. This will include weekly online Sunday services and all our Sunday and weekly group gatherings.

We will continue to offer, weather permitting, our three outdoor mid-week worship events: Evening Prayer at 4PM on Sundays, Tuesdays, and Wednesdays.

We are observing signs of very good news in "turning the corner;" containing and eradicating the COVID Pandemic with the advent of vaccines, reductions in COVID cases throughout the nation with accompanying lower hospitalizations, serious illness, and death. But current conditions with COVID risk entail our offering spiritual practices of vigilance, discipline and compassionate distance—all founded on the Gospel of Christ,

the commandment of neighbor-love, and our Baptismal Covenant.

We certainly, with faith, look forward to the day (which could be even as early as this Spring) when we will be able to offer in-person gathering in some form (including in-building worship if conditions permit). We are hopeful, but we also want to practice the Christian virtue of prudence with wisdom.

In keeping with that virtue, during the Vestry meeting on Monday night, we designated Vestry-led committees to begin planning for Fellowship gatherings and New Member outreach in anticipation of gathering again in-person at some point over the next few months. Thus, we are moving forward with both caution and hope.

I continue to thank our parish Reopening Committee, Vestry, and Wardens for support for the practice of Christian love during these crisis times. Thank you so much for your inspiring commitment to our parish family. We received the very difficult news this week that our nation has surpassed 500,000 deaths from COVID. Our parish, church, and nation has suffered much. To use Lenten language, we are very much in a wilderness time of crisis, suffering, and transformation into a new people of faith.

Our Gospel promises we will journey through such times. Above all, the Gospel promises we have God's grace, love, and power to accompany us.

We extend our prayers, hearts and love in Christ for a meaningful and holy Lent, assured of our Lord's unconditional love and grace.

ST. AUGUSTINE'S CORNER: As we celebrate the resurrection of Our Lord, we share in these festivities with music for choir and chamber orchestra. This ensemble will assist in accompanying the choir in a choral mass, the anthems, and will play for the congregational hymns. The tradition of concerted church music spans the centuries, dating back to the Renaissance, in the music of Praetorius and Gabrieli, through the Baroque Era of oratorio and cantata in the music of Bach and Handel, then through the Classical Era and the Viennese tradition of concerted masses of Haydn and Mozart, to the large scale symphonic works in the Romantic Era of Brahms and Mendelssohn, to the 20th Century and contemporary times in the music of Vaughan Williams to Stephen Paulus. These works are heard in concert halls and churches alike. Today, we have the privilege of hearing such works in liturgical context, which provides depth and inspiration.

Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart was prolific in many musical mediums, equally known for his sacred and secular works, as well as chamber and symphonic compositions. The vast majority of Mozart's sacred opuses were composed early in his short life, while under the employ of the Archbishop of Salzburg. Ironically, arguably his finest and most in-depth liturgical works came after this employment, when he moved to Vienna -- culminating in his Great Mass in c-minor and his Requiem, both of which were left incomplete. Mozart's 'Coronation Mass' was composed in 1779, while in Salzburg, and is the 16th of 17 extant mass settings, most of which were missa brevis (shorter masses). Coronation Mass was premiered for Easter Sunday at the cathedral at Salzburg, on April 4, 1779, and then it was sung at the coronation of Francis II as Holy Roman Emperor in 1792 (one year following Mozart's death) (hence its attribution 'coronation'). We hear the Gloria today as a prelude to set the tone for our service, pre-recorded in 2019 with All Saints' parish choir and the Fairmount Chamber Orchestra.

For other service music, we switch back to the more festive tones of the season. In particular, we will be singing the music of William Mathias, the 20th Century British composer. Most famously, he is known for composing the anthem for the wedding of Charles and Diana in 1981, for St. Paul's Cathedral Choir, a setting of Psalm 67, Let Thy People Praise Thee, O God. The Gloria, Sanctus and Agnus Dei are all taken from his service, and we will sing these settings throughout Eastertide. Our staff singers have also pre-recorded our

Easter anthem "This Joyful Eastertide" a traditional arrangement by turn of the 20th Century British composer and organist, Charles Wood. As a choral benediction, we will have a fun sing-along of Handel's Hallelujah Chorus, follow your score, mute your Zoom and sing! We finish on a festive note, when we will hear the immortal Toccata from French composer Charles-Marie Widor, with rapid passages and driving pedal themes.
