Dear Parish Family and friends,

With gratitude, I am pleased to announce that we will continue to worship in our Parish Sanctuary on Sundays. As usual, our 8:00am service will be Rite I (except for this Sunday 7/18 when there will be no 8am service) and the Rite II service at 10:15 will feature our music program. Following the 10:15AM service, water will be served outdoors at the Chapel side entrance. The 10:15AM service will be live-streamed on our YouTube Channel here: https://www.youtube.com/channel/UC8ACxrceu-3nEAI8cnyU0rQ or on our website here: https://www.allsaintsprinceton.org/live for those who wish to continue to experience online worship.

Our Sunday events for Christian Education including our Sunday Adult Forum, our Sunday Children's programs, and our Sunday Coffee Hour/Movie Discussions will be on "sabbath" for at least a few months while we adjust safely to being together again for Liturgy and Eucharist within our lovely parish sanctuary.

Given the changes from both State of NJ and Diocese of NJ, please note the revised Covenant of Expectations:

- 1.Ushers will still ask you to complete a brief health screen and for you to "sign-in" upon arrival.
- 2.Although we will *not designate seating*, we ask that folks please respect one another's safety and well being in a spirit of neighbor-love. Persons who are not fully vaccinated, please wear a mask as required by the Diocese and State mandates and also keep a six foot distance apart from others. Masks and hand sanitizer are available as needed.
- 3.Anyone who is fully vaccinated (meaning you have received both doses either the Pfizer or Moderna COVID-19 Vaccines AND two weeks have passed since your second dose, or that you've receive one dose of the J&J vaccine AND two weeks have passed since your vaccination) is not required to wear a mask but are also welcome to do so if they so choose.
- 4.Please depart building when service ends. While water is available outdoors upon exit, we are not encouraging extended fellowship time at present.

There are still many folks among us who *are not fully vaccinated*, COVID case numbers in NJ still are still *very high*, and any public gathering carries the risk of COVID spread. We have worked hard to practice the spiritual discipline of neighbor-love by engaging in behaviors that respect public health. We do not want to close out our hard work with any kind of "super-spreader event" and risk damaging all we have done together over this past year to keep one another safe!

We hope to see you Sunday at our service at 10:15AM as we continue to celebrate our gathering again as a parish family!



The Gospel John 6:1-21

Jesus went to the other side of the Sea of Galilee, also called the Sea of Tiberias. A large crowd kept following him, because they saw the signs that he was doing for the sick. Jesus went up the mountain and sat down there with his disciples. Now the Passover, the festival of the Jews, was near. When he looked up and saw a large crowd coming toward him, Jesus said to Philip, "Where are we to buy bread for these people to eat?" He said this to test him, for he himself knew what he was going to do. Philip answered

him, "Six months' wages would not buy enough bread for each of them to get a little." One of his disciples, Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, said to him, "There is a boy here who has five barley loaves and two fish. But what are they among so many people?" Jesus said, "Make the people sit down." Now there was a great deal of grass in the place; so they sat down, about five thousand in all. Then Jesus took the loaves, and when he had given thanks, he distributed them to those who were seated; so also the fish, as much as they wanted. When they were satisfied, he told his disciples, "Gather up the fragments left over, so that nothing may be lost." So they gathered them up, and from the fragments of the five barley loaves, left by those who had eaten, they filled twelve baskets. When the people saw the sign that he had done, they began to say, "This is indeed the prophet who is to come into the world."

When Jesus realized that they were about to come and take him by force to make him king, he withdrew again to the mountain by himself.

When evening came, his disciples went down to the sea, got into a boat, and started across the sea to Capernaum. It was now dark, and Jesus had not yet come to them. The sea became rough because a strong wind was blowing. When they had rowed about three or four miles, they saw Jesus walking on the sea and coming near the boat, and they were terrified. But he said to them, "It is I; do not be afraid." Then they wanted to take him into the boat, and immediately the boat reached the land toward which they were going.






Have mercy, Lord, for we are sinners in your sight.





CAPITAL CAMPAIGN REOPENS!

Dear Friends,

Let us come into his presence with thanksgiving; let us make a joyful noise to him with songs of praise! After 14 months away from All Saints' we are finally back! Let us rejoice! The enforced separation has helped us realize just what a blessing it is to have this special place to gather as Christ's body. We will never again take for granted the ability to pray and sing, to listen and learn, to laugh and love again with friends and family in person in our church home. Being forcefully reminded of its pricelessness, we now know we must do all we can to be good stewards of the church that means so much to so many.

What must we do?

After over 50 years our heating system not only needs repair, but certain major parts need replacement. First, we must immediately address the heating system in the education wing where the heat is not working at all. If we fail to do so, we will lose our income paying tenant, and our Sunday school and choir will not be able to use the area either. This should cost approximately \$300,000. The rest of our heating and cooling needs require an additional \$500,000 but when these repairs must be done is yet to be determined.

What can we do?

The heart of our community life centers around the kitchen. It has served us well for countless coffee hours, picnics, celebrations, and receptions, as well as serving the needs of the day care that rents space from us. But now it is literally falling apart. Our original plans including expanding the parish hall and more, but with the burden of HVAC expenses, how much we can do depends on how much we raise.

Let's do it!

It is a blessing that you can make a difference. Be that blessing and make a donation or pledge now. And remember...

Rejoice in the Lord always, and again I say rejoice!

ADRIAN ARCHER APPOINTED TO WORLD-WIDE MUSIC COMMISSION:

The Archbishop of the West Indies, The Most Reverend Howard Gregory, through the provincial secretariat, has announced the selection of Mr. Adrian A. W. Archer, Director of Music at Christ Church Cathedral, New Providence, as a provincial representative on the commission to plan the music and liturgy for the upcoming Lambeth Conference to be held in Canterbury, England in 2022.

In a statement issued from the Diocesan Office, Bishop of the Diocese, the Right Reverend Laish Boyd congratulated Mr. Archer, the first Bahamian to serve on this prestigious planning commission. "We are proud to be represented at this Anglican Communion-wide table. We congratulate our brother, Adrian, as we know that he will make a meaningful contribution. This is a wonderful opportunity for Church in the Province of the West Indies (CPWI) to make a difference and certainly for the Diocese to be showcased.

The Lambeth Conference usually takes place every 10 years for active Bishops in the Anglican Communion and hosts as many as one thousand Bishops with many spouses, hundreds of adjunct and support staff over multiple weeks of prayer, reflection, fellowship and dialogue on church and world affairs. With the theme of 'God's Church for God's World - walking, listening and witnessing together,' the conference will explore what it means for the Anglican Communion to be responsive to the needs of a 21st Century world.

The music for the Conference is being overseen by Mr. Felix Yeung who is Director of Music at St. John's Cathedral and Provincial Music Director of Music of the Anglican Church in Hong Kong. His team will come from all over the Anglican Communion and begin planning in August of this year.

In addition to his responsibilities at Christ Church, Mr. Archer is the founding conductor of the Highgrove Singers, Musical Director for Shakespeare In Paradise, Music Adjudicator for the E. Clement Bethel National Arts Festival 2021, founder of the Bahamas Choral Institute and Vice Chairman for the Dundas Center for the Performing Arts. He hosts the radio show "Sacred Sounds" which airs on HITS 106.5 FM on Sunday's at 12:00 Noon which explores the varied of gene of music in the sacred world.
