

and treasuring artistic expression.





The Epistle Hebrews 11:8-16

By faith Abraham obeyed when he was called to set out for a place that he was to receive as an inheritance; and he set out, not knowing where he was going. By faith he stayed for a time in the land he had been promised, as in a foreign land, living in tents, as did Isaac and Jacob, who were heirs with him of the same promise. For he looked forward to the city that has foundations, whose architect and builder is God. By faith he received power of procreation, even though he was too old-and Sarah herself was barren-- because he considered him faithful who had promised. Therefore from one person, and this one as good as dead, descendants were born, "as many as the stars of heaven and as the innumerable grains of sand by the seashore."

All of these died in faith without having received the promises, but from a distance they saw and greeted them. They confessed that they were strangers and foreigners on the earth, for people who speak in this way make it clear that they are seeking a homeland. If they had been thinking of the land that they had left behind, they would have had opportunity to return. But as it is, they desire a better country, that is, a heavenly one. Therefore God is not ashamed to be called their God; indeed, he has prepared a city for them.

Then, facing the Holy Table, the Celebrant proceeds

It is right, and a good and joyful thing, always and everywhere to give thanks to you, Father Almighty, Creator of heaven and earth. For you are the source of light and life, you made us in your image, and called us to new life in Jesus Christ our Lord. Therefore we praise you, joining our voices with Angels and Archangels and with all the company of heaven, who for ever sing this hymn to proclaim the glory of your Name:

Sanctus and Benedictus qui venit



The people stand or kneel. Then the Celebrant continues

We give thanks to you, O God, for the goodness and love which you have made known to us in creation; in the calling of Israel to be your people; in your Word spoken through the prophets; and above all in the Word made flesh, Jesus, your Son. For in these last days you sent him to be incarnate from the Virgin Mary, to be the Savior and Redeemer of the world. In him, you have delivered us from evil, and made us worthy to stand before you. In him, you have brought us out of error into truth, out of sin into righteousness, out of death into life.

At the following words concerning the bread, the Celebrant is to hold it, or to lay a hand upon it; and at the words concerning the cup, to hold or place a hand upon the cup and any other vessel containing wine to be consecrated.

On the night before he died for us, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me." After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me." Therefore, according to his command, O Father,

We remember his death, We proclaim his resurrection, We await his coming in glory;

The Celebrant continues

And we offer our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving to you, O Lord of all; presenting to you, from your creation, this bread and this wine. We pray you, gracious God, to send your Holy Spirit upon these gifts that they may be the Sacrament of the Body of Christ and his Blood of the new Covenant. Unite us to your Son in his sacrifice, that we may be acceptable through him, being sanctified by the Holy Spirit. In the fullness of time, put all things in subjection under your Christ, and bring us to that heavenly country where, with all your saints, we may enter the everlasting heritage of your sons and daughters; through Jesus Christ our Lord, the firstborn of all creation, the head of the Church, and the author of our salvation. By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever. **AMEN**.



"Reentering, Reopening, and Reimagining" All Saints Parish: The Way of Love:

The Diocese of New Jersey recently released guidelines for re-opening our parish buildings and grounds for worship and events. It also released guidelines for our tenants and other groups using the parish facilities.

The guidelines generally parallel the Governor's Executive Order. At present, that order calls for a maximum of 50 persons for an event/worship service within a building, or one quarter of the maximum number for the space planned for the event, whichever is lower. It also calls for a maximum of 100 persons for an event outdoors.

In addition, the Diocesan guidelines require six-foot social distancing (or in the words I prefer, social "compassion,") and required wearing of masks by all: event/service leaders and participants. It outlines other norms and requirements that will ensure the safety of all: event and service leaders/clergy, all parishioners and all who use our facilities.

We will not be back to "business as usual" and will need to be creative about our creation of liturgy and church community.

As you can imagine, the planning for any re-opening of our parish facilities for any reason is complex, requiring thoughtful teamwork. I am very pleased to announce that at our June 7th Vestry meeting, our Vestry authorized a sub-committee to work with me for re-opening planning. The committee consists of our Senior Warden, Charles Colagiuri as chair, and includes Junior Warden Roland Patterson, Joan Jones, Suzanne Thompson and Howard Bellizio.

The good news (!) is that we have received approval from Bishop and Diocese to return to some Live-Streaming of our Sunday services from our beautiful parish sanctuary which will include music by organ and soloist as a first step. We will continue with our Sunday services via Zoom, but with music now offered in our sanctuary over the next few Sundays through June, including this Sunday, July 5th.

Enclosed is the link to ALL (!) Diocesan "re-opening" materials; the Diocese of New Jersey; the Diocesan "Reentering, Reopening, and Reimagining" Task Force under the leadership of the Rev. Valerie Balling deserves great acclaim and appreciation for the amazing work and planning which will make this job of parish re-opening, when this happens in God's grace--so much easier and safer for all.

My sisters and brothers in Christ, ultimately, the Gospel of our Lord will govern all we do to continue to respond to this pandemic to ensure the health and safety of our congregation, particularly all the elders among us, and those at risk because of health conditions.

Our theme for Re-opening will be The Way of Love-words used by our Presiding Bishop, the Rt. Rev Michael Curry; this Way is grounded in the "great commandments" of Jesus Christ which are close to the heart of all Episcopalians and enshrined in both scripture and the Book of Common Prayer: The Love of God; and The Love of Neighbor; on these two commandments, rest all else we pray, do and say.
